A Little Tomato History

- 500 BC The first traces of the tomato are found with the Aztecs
 - Spanish conquistador Hernan Cortes brings tomato seeds from the Aztecs to Europe
- MID 15005 Tomatoes are considered poisonous due to the acid mixing with lead in pewter plates and flateware, causing death
- MID 1500S The tomato makes its first appearance in a Nepalese cookbook
 - Joseph Pitto de Tournefort gives the botanical name Lycopersicum to the tomato, meaning "Wolf Peach"
 - 1812 The first recipe for tomato-based ketchup is developed by a scientist in Philadelphia
 - 1820 Tomatoes are put "on trial" in Salem, New Jersey to prove that they are not poisonous
 - 1893 Though botanically a fruit, the tomato is declared a vegetable by the U.S. Supreme Court following the 1887 tariff on vegetables
 - 1918 George Washington Carver publishes 'How to Grow the Tomato and 115 Ways to Prepare it for the Table'
 - 1920 Carl R. Hirzel purchases the Hirzel Farm near Toledo, OH
 - **1920'S** "Hot Tomato" becomes slang for a term of endearment
 - 1923 Hirzel Farms begins growing cabbage and selling sauerkraut
 - **1924** Hirzel Farms begins growing tomatoes
 - 1937 The pronunciation of "tomato" sparks debate after the song "Let's Call the Whole Thing Off" premieres in the film "Shall We Dance"
 - 1947 Hirzel Canning Company is incorporated

1954	The Pemberville, OH plant is purchased
1957	La Tomatina becomes an official "Tomato Throwing" annual festival in Spain
1965	Tomato Juice becomes the official beverage of Ohio
1969	The Bulk Unloading System is first successfully utilized
1983	The Ottawa, OH plant is purchased
1987	The tomato becomes the official state vegetable AND fruit of Arkansas
2003	The tomato becomes the official state fruit of Tennessee
2008	Dei Fratelli hosts it's first "Ripened Recipe Contest"
2009	Dei Fratelli joins Twitter
2009	The tomato becomes the official state fruit of Ohio
2010	Dei Fratelli joins Facebook
2010	State-of-the-art Aseptic Processing Facility is built
2011	Dei Fratelli joins YouTube
